The narrative's structure, reflecting the nonlinear aspect of Henry's time travel, ultimately conveys that identity and love are not confined by the strictures of time, but are instead shaped by the interplay of experiences, memories, and the emotional significance they hold. Niffenegger's ending does not provide a straightforward resolution; rather, it offers a deep contemplation on how time, memory, and love influence our identities, suggesting that even in death, our loved ones remain alive within our hearts and minds. The novel posits that love, while influenced by the uncontrollable forces of time, is a powerful entity that can transcend temporal limits, offering solace, significance, and continuity amidst the inherent transience of life.

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
